RE: Senate Bill No. 246 (Fuller) - Bighorn Desert View Water Agency: Modernization of Enabling Act

Honorable Governor Brown:

Bighorn-Desert View Water Agency is a small water purveyor in the high desert serving approximately 1,900 customers within the communities of Landers, Flamingo Heights and Johnson Valley. One might recognize us as being associated with the 1992 Landers Earthquake which destroyed portions of our water system or from the California Supreme Court case involving Proposition 218 ((*Bighorn-Desert View Water Agency v. Verjil* (July 24, 2006, S127535) \_\_ Cal.4th \_\_))

The Legislature created the Bighorn Mountains Water Agency as a special act special district governed by the uncodified "Bighorn Mountains Water Agency Law" (SB 1175, Coombs, 1969). Eventually, in order to allow the Agency to merge with the Desert View Water District, the Legislature enacted the Desert View Water District-Bighorn Mountains Water Agency Consolidation Law (AB 1819, Woodruff, 1989). Within the Consolidation Law was a requirement to keep the two predecessor water systems financially separate which would essentially negate financial efficiencies expected from the consolidation.

The Agency requested the assistance of Sen. Jean Fuller to carry legislation which helps clarify and reorganize the enabling act. At the urging of the San Bernardino Local Agency Formation Commission (SB LAFCO) we authored SB 246 with the intention of modernizing the enabling act to provide for more transparency and accountability to ratepayers of our district.

Revisions proposed to the Water Agency Law increase transparency by (1) eliminating all references to the "future consolidation" of Bighorn with Desert View; (2) reorganizing the Law by grouping provisions that address a common theme in order to make the Law a more useful resource for research purposes; (3) updating and modernizing certain financial provisions in order to reflect the current State of California law, especially with respect to the power of the Board of Directors to enact taxes (now regulated by Prop. 13) and water service rates (now

regulated by Prop. 218) and eliminating the requirement to maintain separate finances of the pre-consolidation entities.

We have obtained support for SB 246 from the SB LAFCO Commission, Association of California Water Agency (ACWA), California Special Districts Association (CSDA) and various water districts within the Morongo Basin Region. We are pleased to report that SB 246 has been unopposed by both the Senate and the Assembly.

We are asking that you sign SB 246 so that the Agency can begin to operate under these new guidelines.



### "Two Guys and a Bucket of Bleach" Keynote Speaker: Author Michael J. McGuire





McGuire, author of "The Chlorine Revolution: Water Disinfection and the Fight to Save Lives," will share the story of how we got to where we are today in the conquest of waterborne disease in the United States.

McGuire's book, published in April 2013 by the American Water Works Association, is about a physician and his partnership with an engineer during the turn of the 20th century and their plan to build and operate the first, large-scale drinking water disinfection system in the U.S. It's also about the court case at the time that pitted engineering and scientific experts of the day against one another.

### **RESOLUTION NO.13R-XX**

### A POLICY OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BIGHORN-DESERT VIEW WATER AGENCY ESTABLISHING CRITERIA FOR AGENCY FINANCIAL RESERVES

WHEREAS, The Board of Directors of the Bighorn-Desert View Water Agency, acting as the elected legislative body of the Agency, so far as practical, shall fix such rate or rates for water in the Agency.

WHEREAS, in each improvement district, provide for repairs and depreciation of all works, provide a reasonable surplus for improvements, extension, and enlargements, pay the interest on any bonded debt, and provide a sinking or other fund for the payment of the principal of such debt as it may become due, pursuant to California State Water Code Appendix, Section 112-25.

WHEREAS, In order to fulfill the fiduciary responsibilities of the Agency, the financial reserve account shall be established, maintained and updated periodically.

**NOW THEREFORE,** it shall be the Policy of the Agency to manage financial reserves according to the following criteria.

Financial reserves consist of the funds retained in the Agency's account with the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) or other authorized financial institution.

The Local Agency Investment Fund or other financial reserve accounts shall consist of the following sub-accounts:

Account No. 01-13303 - Unencumbered Cash

Account No. 01-13306 - Basic Facilities Charge

Account No. 01-13307 - Customer Deposits

Account No. 01-13309 - Emergency Contingencies

Account No. 01-13310 - Replacement & Refurbishment

Account No. 01-13311 - Encumbered for Projects

Account No. 01-13312 - Bond Debt Service Fund

Authorization for use of funds within the financial reserve sub-accounts shall be as follows:

1. <u>Emergency Contingencies Fund:</u> Expenditures from this fund shall be authorized by the Board of Directors upon presentation of evidence that unencumbered cash is not available to meet an immediate need such as water system repairs or in response to an unforeseen circumstance (e.g. water quality issue or natural disaster).

- 2. <u>Replacement & Refurbishment Fund:</u> Expenditures from this fund shall be authorized by the Board of Directors upon presentation of project costs not contemplated in the annual Operating Budget (e.g. well pump replacement or refurbishment, well rehabilitation, reservoir rehabilitation, etc.).
- 3. <u>Basic Facilities Charges Fund</u>: Expenditures from this fund shall be authorized by the Board of Directors as new capital projects (e.g. mainline extensions, new reservoirs, new wells, etc.).
- 4. <u>Encumbered Funds for Approved Projects:</u> As the Board of Directors authorizes expenditures from another reserve account the specified account will be reduced and the Encumbered Funds account will be increased to show that the funds have been appropriately "set aside" for payment of invoices as the authorized work proceeds.
- 5. <u>Current Customer Deposits:</u> The balance in this fund represents the approximate balance of customer deposits held by the Agency and refunded per the current Rules and Regulations for Water Service.
- 6. <u>Unencumbered Cash Fund:</u> Represents the difference between the total cash reserves and the balances in the identified funds.

<u>Fund Goals:</u> The Board of Directors hereby establishes "fund goals", which should be reviewed periodically to maintain effectiveness, for the following reserve account funds:

- Emergency Contingencies Fund Minimum Goal: \$200,000
- Replacement & Refurbishment Fund Minimum Goal: \$200,000

**BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board of Directors of the Bighorn-Desert View Water Agency:

- 1. Adopts this Resolution 13R-XX Establishing Criteria for Agency Financial Reserves; and
- 2. Policy No. 12P-03 is hereby rescinded.

Dear Mr. McBride:

This letter is to formally acknowledge the dedicated efforts of the Bighorn-Desert View Water Agency's Governing Body, management and staff towards proactive loss prevention and workplace safety. Your agency's efforts have resulted in no "paid" workers' compensation claims for program year 2012-13. A "paid" claim for the purposes of this recognition represents the first payment on an open claim during the prior program year. This is a great accomplishment!

It is through the efforts of members such as Bighorn-Desert View Water Agency that SDRMA has been able to continue providing affordable workers' compensation coverage to over 399 public agencies throughout California. In fact, 242 members or 61% in the workers' compensation program had no "paid" claims in program year 2012-13.

In addition to this annual recognition, members with no "paid" claims during 2012-13 earn 2 credit incentive points (CIPs) thereby reducing their annual contribution amount. Also, members without claims receive a lower "experience modification factor" (EMOD) which also reduces their annual contribution amount.

As SDRMA is dedicated to serving its members and preventing claims, we would appreciate your agency taking a moment and sharing with us what made your District successful in preventing work related injuries. Our goal is to incorporate your successful ideas and suggestions into our loss prevention programs to benefit all members of SDRMA. 


